

What is Shore Friendly?

Shore Friendly Kitsap is a new program to assist marine waterfront homeowners who are interested in voluntarily removing all or part of their old bulkhead

For some locations, bulkheads may not be necessary for erosion protection. Removing all or some of your old bulkhead can:

- enhance the natural beauty of your property
- increase direct access to your beach
- benefit plants and animals



Benefits of Bulkhead Removal

Enhance your property in areas with low erosion risk, improving your waterfront's natural look and beach access

Save money by removing bulkheads that require continual, expensive repairs. Structures may contribute to their own failure by trapping water on the landward side and increasing the threat of land movement.

Improve the beach for plants and animals by taking out bulkheads. Studies show bulkheads reduce habitat, plants, sand, and sediment, and in turn deprive young salmon of food and shelter.
